The Lake Shore Central School District recently conducted a survey asking for input on the possibility of instituting a Capital Construction Project to update, repair, and renovate school properties.

District staff, community members, and students responded with overwhelming positive support for such a project. As a result, the District is moving forward to identify areas of need throughout the District that will provide our students with a learning environment that is safe, clean, and state-of- the art.

As the State requires, all construction project needs are categorized by priority:

Priority 1 – needs that have reached a critical end-of life designation, where they are broken, required to be repaired, updated, and/or renovated by State mandate.

Priority 2 – needs that will reach the level of Priority 1 in the very near future.

Priority 3 – needs that must be repaired, updated, and/or renovated but can be addressed in the next few years.

In order to keep the community advised of the progress of this project, the District will disseminate information as it becomes available. Starting in February, information with pictures and displays will be available in each District building, showing what specifically will be repaired, updated, and/or renovated in that building.

Anyone interested in this project's progress will also find updated information on the District website, the District Twitter feed, and in the Penny Saver and Dunkirk Observer.

We are truly grateful for all the support the faculty, staff and community has shown and continues to show our students. The District firmly believes that the Lake Shore students, faculty, staff, and community members deserve updated, state-of -art facilities.

We hope to address and provide for these needs with this Capital Construction Project.

Winter School Safety

Dressing the Part

As temperatures begin to drop, students need to think about appropriate clothing to protect them from the cold. Hats, coats, and gloves or mittens are necessary to ensure bodies are protected from extreme conditions. This is especially important on windy days in the winter months as lake breezes can have a severe effect on what looks like a bright and sunny day. Make sure students are properly prepared each day as they wait for the bus or walk to school.

Stay Informed

Staying on top of weather conditions is critical in Winter.

Checking forecasts on television, radio, or the internet will help students and families prepare for the changes in weather. But

remember this is Western New York and conditions can change in the blink of an eye. Stay informed throughout the day to stay safe!

Bus Safety

All students should be on time for bus pick-up and standing in a safe spot away from the road. Parents and students alike should avoid standing or playing near piles of snow near bus stops as this may result in a slip-and-fall scenario.

Throwing Snowballs

While tempting when the first snow flies, students should be reminded that throwing snowballs can be very dangerous. Ice, rocks, and other debris can mix with the snow and cause damage to bodies, and buildings. This behavior is discouraged at school.

Lake Shore First Book Event 'A Marvel'

T here were 5,300 First Books stacked up in the middle school cafeteria at Lake Shore and lines of nearly 1,000 eager children waiting to own them, read them and share them. Each student was allowed to choose five books.

"Kids were bumping into each other because their noses were in the middle of their new books," said Michele Amoia, a third-grade teacher who co-chaired the event with Shannon Muldowney, a middle school science teacher, both members of the Lake Shore Central Teachers' Association. "We had 950 kids and more than 2,000 community members."

For the students, it was a marvel.

"The look on their faces was as if the Buffalo Sabres had won the Stanley Cup," said Anthony George, president of the Lake Shore Central Teachers' Association.

About 100 teachers and teacher aides worked at the "Literacy Across Lake Shore" event, which was sponsored by the 261-member LSCTA in Erie County.

Drinking Water

Individual Building Reports Below

It is a priority of every school district to maintain a safe and healthy learning environment for its students, and clean water is no exception. In 1986, Congress banned the use of lead solder containing greater than 0.2% lead and restricted the lead content of faucets, pipes, and other plumbing materials. Lead is unusual among drinking water contaminants in that it seldom occurs naturally in water supplies like groundwater, rivers, and lakes. New laws that went into effect in 2014 reduced the amount of lead that plumbing fixtures can contain from 8% to 1%. Brass faucets, fittings and valves – including those advertised as "lead free" – may still contribute lead to drinking water.

The Lake Shore Central School District is in compliance with New York State Public Health Laws requiring all schools and Boards of Cooperative Educational Services (BOCES) to test potable water outlets for lead contamination, to remediate contamination where found, and to notify parents of children and the public of test results. Levels of lead at any water outlet above 15 parts per billion (ppb) require action to remediate this issue.

As required, the Lake Shore Central School District tested all water sources in the A. J. Schmidt, Highland, & J. T. Waugh Elementary Schools, and the W. T. Hoag Educational Center for lead on September 24, 2016, and in the High School, Middle School, and Transportation Department on October 23, 2016. As provided to us under specific protocols, first draw water samples were taken after letting the water remain unmoving in the pipes over a period of 8 to 18 hours.

The Lake Shore Central School District is taking a number of steps to correct the problems noted in the results. We have shut off the water supply to those fixtures used for drinking or cooking. Any water sources used for other purposes such as washing and general cleaning have been clearly labeled with warning signs not to be used for drinking or cooking. The next step is to develop a remediation plan that will be approved and guided by the experts in the field of water remediation. Please be assured that adequate water fountains are available throughout the building for student use.

The timetable for remediation of each of the identified sources will depend on the availability of parts, installation, and the process for retesting. It is important to note that none of the sources will be put back into service and available for drinking or cooking until the sources are fully mitigated and meet New York State Department of Health Standards.

Copies of the water testing results will be made available in each building's main office upon receipt. Office hours are Monday through Friday from 8:00 am to 4:00 pm. Results by building will also be posted on our website as they are received by the District.

Paul Gradl - Class of 1998

Paul Gradl is a Senior Propulsion Engineer at NASA Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville, Alabama. He is also a proud father, husband, author, volunteer and entrepreneur. Paul's work has advanced manufacturing techniques and optical measurement technologies, evolved new liquid rocket engines, and supported shuttle launches to the International Space Station (ISS). He is currently working on the NASA mission to Mars. A1998 graduate of Lake Shore Central, Paul knew in high school his focus would be engineering, and he pursued that path with technical classes and community college courses while attending Lake Shore. During his "free time" he worked in the family landscape business developing his entrepreneurial side. Following high school, Paul attended Gannon University and completed a Bachelor degree in Mechanical

Engineering. He went on to complete an MBA while working as an engineer on locomotives for General Electric Transportation Systems in Erie, PA. 2004, Paul joined NASA following the Shuttle Columbia tragedy and directed a debris impact testing team that led NASA's Return to Flight efforts on the Space Shuttle Main Engines. His team helped develop flight rationale to ensure future shuttle missions would be safer. He supported all 22 shuttle missions through the end of the program.

In parallel, Paul completed a Masters in Engineering from the University of Alabama Huntsville in 2007 Mr. Gradl went on to provide engineering expertise for NASA's new rocket engine development program, J-2X, which was the agency's new upper stage engine for an Earth departure launch vehicle. Paul led several technical teams in the development and advancement of new technology including rocket engine nozzles and combustion chambers, handheld laser welding, advanced coatings, structured light scanning and dynamic image correlation for advanced manufacturing and testing.

Paul's contributions to the NASA mission have earned multiple awards and recognition. In 2011 and 2012, he was awarded NASA Exceptional Achievement Medals, one of NASA's highest honors. It is awarded to an individual in the Federal service for a significant, specific accomplishment or substantial improvement in operations and technology which contributes to NASA's mission. Other notable recognition includes Space Flight Honoree, Ares Program "Made It Happen" Award, a NASA Certificate of Appreciation, a NASA Special Service Award, NASA Technology Transfer Award, the Marshall Space Flight Center Research and Technology Award and the NASA Engineering Directorate Partnership Award. Mr. Gradl received the Young Alumni Award from Gannon University in 2011 for his accomplishments and has been a guest lecturer at international conferences and national universities.

In 2010, Paul was awarded the 2010 Eugene L. Grant Award by The Engineering Economist Journal, which is the Engineering Economy Division of the American Society of Engineering Education. He has also received a U.S. patent in his field for an innovative laser processing

received a U.S. patent in his field for an innovative laser processing technique for repairs on critical rocket hardware.

Mr. Gradl resides in Huntsville, Alabama with his wife Leah and their children, Dax and Tess. He considers his family his greatest accomplishment. Paul stays active playing ice hockey and frequently coached youth teams prior to having kids. (He hopes to coach Dax on the ice soon.) Paul intertwines his technical passion with music and business as an accomplished disc jockey. He finds time to DJ 20+ events per year, including regional and national performances, most notably in Las Vegas and Atlanta. He has been involved in the local startup community with his weekend inventions and won a local "Shark Tank" style competition.

"It was such an amazing event. It exceeded all of our wildest expectations," said George. "We're lucky to have Ms. Amoia and Ms. Muldowney. I've organized large-scale events, but nothing this large. The skillset these teachers have was on full display. It went off flawlessly. They expanded what they do in the classroom every day."

The smell of barbequing chicken wafted across the entrance to the school. Chicken dinners were sold by teachers to raise money for scholarships that the LSCTA awards to high school seniors. The dinners quickly sold out.

"We give out two \$3,000 scholarships a year. We might be able to increase that for a third scholarship now, in part because of the success of the chicken barbeque," said George. He said he met parents who he'd never met at open house or for school events. Entire families came to the book night. It might have been hard to tell who was more pumped up about the event: kids or teachers.

"We are super excited," said Amoia when she was prepping for the book night. It was through her work as a NYSUT Political Action Committee coordinator for her region that Amoia heard about the community outreach available through First Book. Her fellow PAC coordinator, Cheryl Hughes from Kenmore-Tonawanda, inspired her to try a book give-away after her own local's successful event.

At Lake Shore, youngsters and teens were given "Literacy Passports" made by students and teachers in the art department. Five books equaled five stamps, enabling the youngsters and teens to drop their passport into a drawing. A raffle was held for five door prizes: five book shelves handmade from repurposed barn board by Lockport TA member and physical education teacher Danielle Hagen.

Five families from each of the district's five schools went home with new bookcases.

The road to get these books to this western New York community was lined with unions. The American Federation of Teachers is a partner with First Book, a nonprofit that gets donated books into the hands of students in need. NYSUT, an AFT affiliate, has been working for more than three years to help local unions with Title I schools to sign up for First Book. This year, NYSUT and First Book have provided nearly \$3 million worth of books to students in New York schools.

Many schools have held First Book events this fall.

Before the big book night out in Lake Shore, there was other behind-the-scenes action happening. Many teachers worked on "sorting night" to prepare the books for the give-away. The books had arrived stacked in snug plastic wrappings on wooden pallets.

"I had members who rarely ever come out who came out for this event. It's about the kids and literacy," Amoia said. 'It was such a fun member engagement night."
