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
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### Six Nations Flag Represented at Lake Shore

About a month ago, Owens approached James Przepasniak, the superintendent, to talk about the possibility of having the flag on display and almost immediately, the district's leader agreed, recognizing that nearly 350 students, which is about 15% of the district's students, are Native American.

"It really just shows they care about everyone here and not just one group," said Ryan.

"It's important for unity," said Przepasniak. "[It's important] that all students are recognized and feel a sense of belonging in the school's population."

Ryan's mom, Brandy, says she's amazed the district agreed to display the flags.

"When he told me, I was so proud," said Brandy. "Not only proud as a mom but proud as a member of the Seneca Nation."

#### Why Your Child's Attendance Matters



Student attendance in school is one of the best indicators of a child's eventual success in life. Studies have shown a link between chronic absenteeism at the elementary and middle school level, and high school student drop-out rates. It's no surprise then, that educators continue to search for ways to reduce the rate of student absenteeism.

A student is considered to be chronically absent if they miss 10% or more of a school year. That's roughly 18 days out of a 180 day school year. Just think about what your child would be missing if they are absent for that many days. There is the obvious loss of learning just from missing 18 lessons in their various classes. However, that loss may be compounded in future lessons because the child may have missed important foundational concepts that were taught when they were absent.

They could also miss taking tests or quizzes. While they might not mind missing those, test and quizzes provide their teachers with important information about their level of learning – they help the teacher "keep their finger on the pulse of the class". If your child is frequently absent, it makes it harder for the teacher to take their pulse!

There is also a social & emotional aspect to school that children miss when they are absent. Children benefit developmentally from interactions with their peers both in and out of the classroom. These also carry over into classroom discussions during lessons. When a child is absent, everybody in the classroom loses. The child who is absent doesn't get to hear what his or her classmates discuss, but equally important, the child's classmates don't get to hear what they would have thought and said on the issues being discussed. The child also loses the benefit of spending time with other children who are at the same stages physically and emotionally.

The school district as an organization loses when a child is absent. Various funding sources that the District receives are linked to student attendance. State Aid, Erie County Sales Tax revenues and Federal Impact Aid are all negatively impacted each and every time one of our children is absent from school. This means that school taxes must cover the loss in those revenues, in order to keep the District's schools operating.

The entire Lake Shore School Community can develop a culture that values and promotes student attendance. We all have a vested interest in having our children in school all day, every day.



### **District Energy Report**

#### **Conservation and Efficiency Saves Big Dollars**

Lake Shore Central School District committed to reducing its energy usage, costs and carbon footprint by purchasing an Energy Conservation Program named Energy Education. Since the program started in July of 2012, Lake Shore has saved district taxpayers \$776,156 or 22.1%.

Besides saving money on utility bills, our program's cumulative greenhouse gas reduction is equivalent to removing 2,688 metric tons of carbon dioxide from the air.

This energy reduction impact is comparable to removing 560 passenger cars from the roads for one year or planting 68,936 tree seedlings and letting them grow for ten years.



Broken down by utility, the district has reduced its electric bills by 26.2% or \$637,968, its natural gas bills by 12.2% or \$102,803, and its water bills by 15.7% or \$35,385. The decrease in electric usage has been helped along by LED lighting upgrades throughout the district, HVAC scheduling adjustments and because everyone who works at Lake Shore has the ability to turn off the lights and other electric equipment when not needed. With natural gas, our usage is determined by the cold weather. The middle school which is heated by roof top gas fired units is our most efficient building because the units are only using natural gas during occupied times of the school day. The other buildings in the district are heated with hot water heat which requires boilers to keep warm water flowing through the heating pipes on cold days.

The majority of the savings were realized through the meticulous monitoring of usage, tight schedule controls along with evening and weekend energy audits. Before the program started, software problems allowed our middle school to run non-stop during the winter and summer months.

Now, when the school day ends during the cold weather months, the night time and weekend temperature is setback to 55 degrees. That doesn't mean teachers or students who are still in the buildings are suddenly shivering. The temperatures rarely reach the 55 degree night time set back temperature. During the warm weather months the air conditioning does not kick back on until the next scheduled occupancy time.

To keep track of the energy savings, we use a third party software called EnergyCAP to enter utility bill data into. This software processes the new data entered and compares it to data from a base year, which was the year preceding the start of the program. To compensate for the differences in weather between the base year and the current year, EnergyCAP makes adjustments by calculating heating and cooling degree days. This way the measurement and verification done by EnergyCAP insures the software is making like comparisons even if the weather in the current year was different from the base year.

While Lake Shore Central School District has completely paid for the program, Cenergistic's (formally Energy Education Inc.) service to the district will continue on an as need basis to help keep our program on the right track. Cenergistic will provide ongoing training, data analysis and any support that is requested without any additional charges.

### **New NYS Standards Announced**

If your child is in 4th, 5th or 6th grade, you will hear them talk about how they are connecting with other kids around the world. On October 4-5, some Lake Shore teachers and students were introduced to Belouga from Evin Schwartz, Founder & CEO at Belouga and Matt Murrie, the Chief Curiosity Curator of What If...?360 and author of The Book of What If...?

Belouga is a web based platform connecting classes throughout the world, with a mission to build a global ecosystem of students and teachers and instill emotional equity in each user by identifying similarities and embracing differences through everyday communication.



As a result of this work, students will utilize technology to enrich their lives by connecting them globally to resources and experiences that can open minds and broaden their understanding of the world beyond our school walls. This is a Lake Shore Board of Education goal.

Our technology integrators and Belouga consultant are in full gear to support the learning and excitement of this powerful resource.

The New York State Board of Regents P-12 Committee approved new P-12 Science Learning Standards. These standards are based on two nationally respected guiding documents, feedback from teachers, school and district administrators, and on survey data that indicated the need to adapt specific portions of the standards to reflect New York's mission and vision for P-12 science education. K-12 Science teachers will begin learning about these new standards in the 2017-18 school year and updates will be provided as teachers transform the Science teaching and learning K-12.

The New York State Next Generation ELA and Mathematics Standards have been released. They are defined as the knowledge, skills, and understanding that individuals can and do habitually demonstrate over time when exposed to high-quality instructional environments and learning experiences. The New York State Education Department is rolling out resources for schools to use to learn about the new standards. The standards will provide us the vision of 21st century learning in ELA and Math preparing our students to become lifelong learners and thinkers.

### Staff Attends Specialized Training

**O**ver 70 Lake Shore staff members attended four days of intense training provided by Summit Educational Resources. The professional development was geared towards addressing the needs of our students with autism. Special Education teachers, teaching assistants, personal care aides, therapists and school psychologists participated in the training.

The training was offered by Summit Educational Resources as part of a program package called Summit Up that the School District purchased to support the unique learning needs of our students with autism.

Along with four days of training, the package also includes

the use of special web based programs that allow teachers and staff to customize lesson plans, goals and behavioral strategies for each of our students. Summit Up was developed by the specialists in autism at Summit Educational Resources and uses only research based practices and learner outcomes.

The training covered autism spectrum disorders, the principals of Applied Behavioral Analysis and data based decision making. Staff were provided with iPads to access the web based program which provides curriculum based on individual student assessments. Trainees were able to become familiar with all aspects of the program. Summit Up training will continue with trainers visiting each special class to conduct student assessments and support our staff in using the program to meet the unique needs of our students with autism.
