## *Easton Selected As Conference Attendee*

Karleigh was selected out of hundreds of applicants nationwide for this week-long summer program, after being nominated by her art teacher, Marcia Belliotti. At the conference, Karleigh will attend keynote speeches from astronomers and medical scientists like Alex Filippenko, Brandy Schillace, and Mario Livio. She will also participate in a variety of STEAM workshops and activities where she will work collaboratively with other students from around the state.





## High School Orchestra Receives Silver Award at NYSSMA Festival

As many people know, a large part of being a musician is critiquing your playing. Luckily, as young students we have many opportunities to test our knowledge and skill at many festivals. During the spring of 2018, for the first time the Lake Shore Senior High School Symphony Orchestra was bestowed the chance to perform at NYSSMA, also known as New York State School Music Association. NYSSMA is an association of music educators from all over New York that come together to hear schools play their music and assess their playing based on their knowledge of music. They believe “that every student deserves the right to receive a well-rounded education that includes a comprehensive, sequential, high-quality program of music taught by a qualified music educator.”



Under the direction of Mr. Nicholas D'Amato, we traveled to Williamsville North High School to play for two esteemed judges. Before the day of the assessment came we had to put forth a lot of hard work and dedication. We received three level four pieces back in November of 2017, *Overture to Rienzi* by Richard Wagner, *Warrior Legacy* by Soon Hee Newbold and lastly, *Overture to Nabucco* by Giuseppe Verdi. All three pieces exemplify the many difficult tasks of playing music. This consists of bow control, changes in dynamics, intonation, key changes, etc., but most importantly, adding emotion to the music you're playing.

In the days leading up to the performance we practiced and practiced until before we knew it we were on stage in front of the judicators. In that very moment where your sitting on stage you have many emotions and thoughts surging through you. You wonder if you practiced enough, if you're posture is straight enough, you rerun measures in your mind, and before you know it the judges give you the gesture that it is time to start. We all practiced for this thirty minute performance for six months and we were ready!

The Symphonic Orchestra walked away from the festival with a silver rating, and a plethora of wonderful comments from our two judicators, but we were also were given constructive criticism to better our playing for next time. Silver ratings are awarded to ensembles that have demonstrated an excellent level of technical and artistic skill in each of the evaluative categories.

Overall NYSSMA was a very eye opening experience that has pushed us as an ensemble to work hard and to strive for better and not just satisfactory.

## *Hour of Code at A.J. Schmidt*

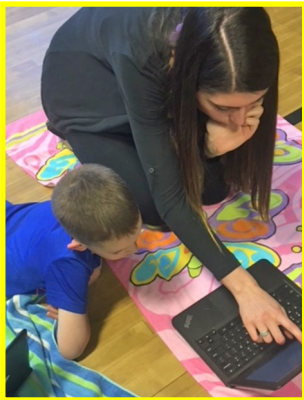
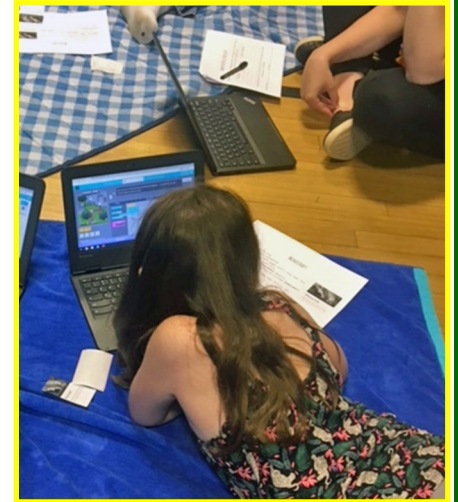

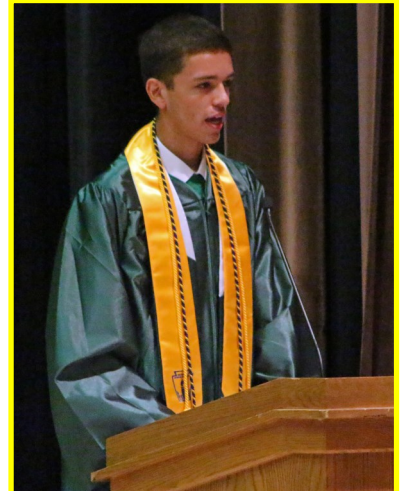
