The Lake Shore boys volleyball team is a state champion.

On Jan. 26, the varsity team and its two coaches, head bench boss John Coyle and assistant Bill Anderson, assembled for a celebration and photo session inside the high school. It was a celebration of the players' prowess and commitment in the classroom, a celebration of their brains, a celebration of them prioritizing the "student" aspect of studentathlete.

Lake Shore was recently named the New York State Public High School Athletic Association's Scholar-Athlete Team state champion for boys volleyball.

Nearly 100 teams across the state had a combined academic average of 90 or above in the fall, but no squad had a higher mark than Lake Shore's 97.44.



ake Shore came close to capturing athletic glory in 2012, when it fell in the NYSPHSAA Division II championship bout to Bellmore. The Eagles have avenged that a little by achieving academic glory.

But the strive for a championship should never get in the way of what truly matters, and that's the classroom. The books were never on the back burner for the Eagles. In fact, the smarts were even apparent to Coyle during practices and in games.

"It's not just intelligence in the classroom," the coach said. "You talk about psychological intelligence that kids have, you don't have to tell them to work hard. They do it anyway. It's a transferred skill from the classroom to the court."

Changes to State Testing *ELA and Math exam updates*

The New York State Education Department (NYSED) is making significant changes to the 2016 Grades 3-8 English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics Tests. NYSED has selected Questar Assessment, Inc. as the new vendor to lead the development of the future New York State Grades 3-8 ELA and Mathematics Tests. NYSED has also collected significant feedback from students, parents, and New York State educators regarding ways to improve the tests.



These changes will improve the testing experience for students and the validity of the assessments.

Specifically, beginning in fall 2015 and going forward, a greater number of New York State educators have been and will continue to be involved in the review of test questions and final test forms than ever before. A new way that educators are already contributing to the Grades 3-8 ELA and Mathematics Tests is through the construction of the final test forms that will be administered to students this spring.

One of the most consistent recommendations made to NYSED was to reduce the length of the tests. Based on feedback, NYSED has decreased the number of test questions on both the 2016 Grades 3-8 ELA and Mathematics Tests. On each of the 2016 Grades 3-8 ELA Tests students will read one less passage and answer fewer questions. This will allow students more time to read the passages more closely and apply their knowledge and skill in answering the questions, and is expected to also decrease testing fatigue for some students. On the 2016 Grade 3-8 Mathematics Tests students will also have fewer questions to answer.

In addition to a change in testing vendor, greater teacher involvement in test creation, and fewer test questions, NYSED has also received extensive feedback from educators from throughout the State about the inability of students to work at their own pace on the Grades 3-8 ELA and Mathematics Tests. As a result, NYSED is pleased to announce the transition to untimed testing for the Spring 2016 Grades 3-8 ELA and Mathematics Tests. This change will provide students further opportunity to demonstrate what they know and can do by allowing them to work at their own pace. In general, this will mean that as long as students are productively working they will be allowed as much time as they need to complete the ELA and Mathematics tests.

These changes are just some of the efforts that NYSED is committed to implementing to improve the quality of the State's assessments and the experiences that students have taking these tests.

Therapy Services Offered at Lake Shore

Related services such as Occupational and Physical Therapy are offered to students with disabilities as determined by their Individual Education Plan (IEP) or 504 Plan. These services may be provided individually or in small groups, in the classroom or as a pull out session in a therapy room.

The services are provided at all schools in the district.

The Committee on Special Education (CSE) or 504 Committee determines the students eligibility for services once the therapist completes an evaluation. Not every student needs treatment, even if the student has a disability. Occupational and Physical Therapists will collaborate with the school

staff and other professionals about the needs of the pupils.

School based Occupational Therapy is designed to enhance the student's ability to fully access and be successful in the learning environment. This may include working on: activities of daily living,

The Lake Shore Central School District would like to remind parents about MyStop[™], which is a web based application that provides mobile access to their student's bus information.

Parents/guardians can download the MyStop[™] app from the District website. MyStop[™] graphically displays the school bus location on a map, as well as the estimated time of arrival to a specific student's bus stop. This app is helpful for parents/guardians to know the whereabouts of their student due to traffic or weather conditions.



handwriting, fine motor skills, and organizational skills, modifying and adapting learning materials, visual perceptual skills, and sensory integration.

Physical Therapy in the schools is provided when the students have a gross motor difficulty that is



impacting them educationally. It is designed to enable the student to travel throughout the school environment, participate in classroom activities, maintain and change positions in the classroom, as well as manage stairs, restrooms, and the cafeteria.

Physical Therapy can assist the students to gain the

strength, balance, mobility and motor planning skills necessary to access their education. Physical Therapists can also assist with identifying and obtaining specialized equipment. Occupational and Physical Therapists are required by law to obtain a prescription from the child's physician before providing intervention.

Still Cold Out There!

The District would like to remind parents, students and community members to bundle up for the elements - with mittens/gloves, hat, and winter coat.

<u>Dress appropriately for cold weather</u>: * Wear several layers of loose-fitting, lightweight, warm clothing. Trapped air between layers will insulate you. Remove layers to avoid sweating and subsequent chill.

* Outer garments should be tightly woven, water repellent, and hooded.

* Wear a hat because much of your body heat can be lost from your head.

* Cover your mouth to protect your lungs from extreme cold.

- * Mittens, snug at the wrist, are better than gloves.
- * Try to stay dry and out of the wind.




Energy Savings Update

This is the latest Cost Avoidance Report from our Energy Conservation Program. This report tracks the Lake Shore Central School District's energy savings from **November 2012 thru December 2015**.

To date we have reduced our energy costs throughout the district by **\$492,501 or 20.4%** since the program started.

The **BATCC Cost** in the report represents Baseline Adjusted to Current Conditions Cost. When Lake Shore implemented the Energy Conservation Program, I entered the data from the previous year's utility bills to create a base line from which we calculate the savings of the program.

To ensure the reported savings are attributed to the energy program and not an outside variable such as the difference in weather, the **Energy CAP** software used to track energy usage and savings makes adjustments based on heating and cooling degree days during the billing period to protect the integrity of the program.

Health Reminder to Parents and Guardians of Students

s of September 1, 2016, all 7th and 12th grade students MUST HAVE Meningococcal vaccines (shots) in order to attend school.

NYS law requires each parent or guardian provide the school with an immunization (shot) record from a health care provider, health department, or official immunization record from the child's previous school that shows their child has received, or is in the process of receiving the required vaccines (shots) in order to attend school. The date each immunization was given must be included in the record.

- Students in Grade 7 will require proof of 1 dose of Meningococcal vaccine.
- Students in Grade 12 will require either:
 - 2 doses of Meningococcal vaccine with the booster dose given on or after age 16
 - 1 dose if your child's first dose was given on or after age 16

Please contact your health care provider to make sure your child has what they need to attend school this fall. Bring the immunization record to the School Health Office where it will be copied and returned if you wish. If you have any questions or concerns about immunizations, please contact the school health office.


Author Shares Life Lessons with Students
