Hello Everyone,

Things are looking better. As you know, we're still wearing masks inside, but New York State no longer requires face masks outdoors on school grounds. While that's one of many restrictions slowly lifting, cautionary measures are still in place. Those who want to wear a mask outdoors may do so, and responsible parties may instill their own face mask requirements outdoors.


The reduced restrictions and reduced rate of COVID-19 are largely attributed to people getting vaccinated. With so many older adults now vaccinated, however, health officials note that chil-

dren and teens are now most at risk for COVID-19. Still, infection rates are falling and, unlike several weeks ago, COVID-19 vaccinations are now readily available.

The Erie County Department of Health will host a Pfizer Vaccination clinic at the High School Gymnasium on Saturday, June 19th, from 9 am to 1 pm 12-to–18-year olds. The second dose is July 10th, also at the High School, from 9 am to 1 pm. Adults 18+ also are welcome and they would receive the one-dose J&J vaccine. Over the past year and a half, we've adjusted and readjusted to many changes. She has been the three-year starting goalie for Lake Shore High School and also has been a member of the Haudenosaunee Nationals U19 Women's World Team, Haudenosaunee Nationals 2019 PALA Team and WNY Rochester 2019 Team. Fantasy supports and pays respect to her community by consistently volunteering and working with local children.

She attributes her lacrosse success to her competitive nature. "I'm a really competitive person," says Fantasy, "If I feel like there's someone who's doing more than me, I'll try to catch up and put in extra training. Lacrosse has always been my rock, It's always been there for me." She says it has taught me many valuable things:



"They're working in Unreal Engine, a powerful, realtime 3D creation program, and they're learning the C++, programming language through game development. They have explored coding in Scratch (a block-based language) and Python prior to their AP exam," says Special Education Teacher Devon Asboth. "Now they're working on new languages to create video game platforms and HTML, JavaScript, and CSS by designing apps using a program called MAD-Learn."

"When students learn programming, it's important to work with the latest software applications to get experience with products used in the field. Unreal Engine gives them a chance to work with interactive 3D content, learn game mechanics, and explore visual based coding. This empowers students to become creators with technology. It is also reshaping visual communication, solving problems, and telling stories in an entirely new way. There is a great demand in the workforce for people with these skills and it has been great working with the students to grow these skills," says Technology Integrator Michael Drezek.



Keeping Us Safe & Our Buildings Open







Although the positivity rate is dropping, to keep our buildings open and staff, students and colleagues safe from COVID-19:
