

Studying Our Space

In Tuesday night's Board of Education discussion about space issues in the District's elementary schools, Board of President Jennifer Michalec emphasized that the study of a possible 5th grade move to the Middle School is just the starting point of a broader, more complex discussion. Currently, 11 internal committees are meeting, and two parent committees are being formed, for input on a solutions such as different primary grade configurations across buildings, increasing class size, adding annex structures, remodeling space, attrition, redistricting—or a combination thereof—or

The space crunch evolved not due to numbers of students in the buildings, but because of the growing number of spaces needed for special education, Native American and other services, as well as instrumental lessons and other activities. Ensuring equity of facilities among the buildings also is an important factor, said Superintendent Dan Pacos.

The committees will look at all options, said Assistant Superintendent for Instruction Melissa Bergler, adding that the committees that have met thus far agree that whatever decision is made, it should be one that creates space where students and staff feel valued.

But so is Michelle Krieger.

Meet Our New Data Protection Officer!

For 15 years, Michelle Krieger worked as a special education teacher in the Holland Central School District. Things began to change in 2014, when technology started coming in. The smart boards came in, the carts with devices to sign out came in, and Mrs. Krieger realized she was falling in love – with technology.

"I saw how technology helped my special education students access curriculum," she says. "I saw the dyslexic student who had wonderful ways to contribute verbally, shut down when he was asked to respond in writing. With technology, we could record his responses through the iPad, so what he wanted to say wasn't lost in translation from thinking to writing."

"Another student struggled with decoding," she continues. "So we used technology that read stories and articles to him. The student could focus on content that he was hearing, rather than struggling to decode words."

She also used Newsela and ReadWorks so articles could be assigned based on a student's reading level. "It had the same information and follow up questions, but it leveled the reading to reach them," she says. Mrs. Krieger was intrigued, and she learned ... and learned and learned.

As Holland CSD moved toward being a 1:1 district – one computer for every student – Mrs. Krieger moved from special education teacher

to Technology Integration Specialist (TIS), helping all K-12 teachers implement technology in the classroom. As use of technology and software grew, she grew into a dual role — that of TIS and Technology Coordinator. Soon, the Technology Coordinator position grew to full-time, and also grew to encompass the role of Data Protection Officer. "I was learning all I possibly could," she says.
