Following the Board of Education Meeting of October 6, 2020



Hello Everyone,

One thing we've learned over the past several months is the importance of being nimble. Guidance continually evolves as we better understand Covid-19 and adjust accordingly. The Board of Education heard about these updates and adjustments at its work session on Tuesday evening:

Revised guidance from the Erie County Department of Health related to quarantine and return-to-school/work requirements for persons in extended periods of time in proximity situations. On a related note, you may have seen the NYS Covid Dashboard report showing four positive student cases in our school district. Three of those cases are fully remote students who are not attending here in person, and one is a student residing in the district who is not enrolled in LSCSD schools. At this point, we have no reports of in-person student or staff cases.

Remember, however, if you feel you need testing, rapid-testing is available to ALL school district staff who work in buildings. Appointments must be made at (716) 858-2929 and are on weekday mornings, first-come, first-served. If your physician tells you to get a Covid-19 test, make sure they know you're eligible for rapid testing because you work in a school district.

- Updated daily screening questionnaire for students/employees. The questions now address whether YOU, not someone you know, have been in close or proximate contact, tested positive, had symptoms, traveled internationally, etc.
- Marking kids present when they are not turning in work is not the Lake Shore standard. Once we have technology in the hands of students, we will shift attendance expectations. Many thanks to Terry Maiorana for entering the technology survey results into spreadsheet format. Jeff Barnes and Vicky Trimm tabulated the numbers and within the next several days we aim to have a device to 328 households that need one for remote learning. By the way, 99% of the devices loaned out last spring have been returned to the district.
- This month we're sending a letter to families of elementary remote learners to ask about their intent to return to school on November 16 and begin the second trimester with us. Stay tuned.

Our pandemic year continues to unfold and evolve. Your continued commitment, flexibility, patience and support are much appreciated.

What are the changes at Lake Shore High School for return to school this year? High School Principal Christine Koch gave the Board of Education an inside look during its Tuesday night work session, with a building tour and presentation.

She covered the new protocols regarding masks, daily screening questionnaires and temperature-taking, and six foot distancing. Having half the students in person on given days also allows another precaution, she told them: Green Eagle team and White Eagle team hallway lockers alternate, allowing more spacing. And you really don't want to go up the down staircase here —you go up OR down, as signage directs, to eliminate close passing from opposite directions.

Keeping students physically safe is just part of the school's oversight, she said. In September, student surveys were conducted asking how the students were doing. This month, another survey will ask what needs they may have. In this way, the school can better provide the appropriate supports. "Our concerns are socialemotional first, academic second," said Mrs. Koch. "These are kids who haven't been in our buildings in months and we want to know where they are at and how we can help."

For all practices and games, coaches have Covid Kits. The kits include hand-held, no-touch thermometers for taking athletes' temperatures before each event, as well as equipment disinfectant spray, hand sanitizer, and protective gloves and masks.



Back-to-School updates to the Board of Education on Tuesday night included a look at the State of Sports & Extracurriculars. Boys and Girls Varsity and JV soccer and modified soccer are on, as are cross country, Girls Varsity swimming, tennis and golf, said Superintendent Charles Galluzzo.

"We're following NYS regulations for two spectators per athlete," adds Athletic Director Daryl Besant. ECIC has purchased spectator credentials on lanyards. Spectators must wear them at all times, along with masks, and maintain social distancing. Six foot circles are drawn on the soccer fields to ensure appropriate spectator distancing. "You pick a pod," says Mr. Besant. For girls swimming, there still are no on-site spec-

tators, but the district is going to set up a YouTube channel for livestreaming so parents can watch the events, he said.

Some extracurriculars also are back in play, including student government at the Middle School and High School, and Yearbooks.

"Last year's High School Jazz Ensemble completed a project during our virtual instruction period. I didn't roll it out to the district as it was nearing the end of school and I was afraid most wouldn't hear it or were 'virtually exhausted,'" says High School Band Director Eric Blodgett.

"Jacob DeAngeils (2020 grad) really headed up the project and most students contributed," says Mr. Blodgett. "It was our first attempt at a studentcontrolled project, completely virtual. We created a Jazz Classroom and I gave Jacob and Dylan Barrett admin rights. They worked on getting the student submissions and engineered them into a final mix. I only offered a few suggestions along the way."

This semester, they are learning to teach math to elementary students but to minimize interactions with students, they prepare lessons for the classroom teachers to present and often their work is done virtually.

The gardens at A.J. Schmidt, however, provide a way to bring the youngsters outside and create high interest lessons. Dr. Lauren Ormsby brings in chickens and rabbits from her Sunset Sky Farm in Westfield, so teaching math can blend with lessons about tending the garden and the animals.
