

Teaching the Teachers



"As indigenous people we view ourselves as a large family, political or governmental boundaries," Jordan Cooke. Cultural Activities Coordinator for the Seneca Nation,

told a group of teachers on March 24th. Jordan Cooke, Onondaga, Deer Clan, presented a Professional Development Course sponsored by the Title VII program. Professional Development is a variety of short courses offered after the school day, throughout the year to teachers. Speaking on "Understanding Native American Culture", Jordan explained the

basic tenets of the Iroquois, what he termed "Fundamental Values": Earth is our Mother, have compassion for one another, and practice forgiveness— "Everyone makes mistakes," Jordan laughtranscendent of ingly explained. He spoke of various aspects of the Iroquois such as how the Seneca came to be known as Keepers of the Western Door and the Mohawk Keepers of the Eastern Door, and how different tribes operate under different governmental systems, either a traditional chieftain system or an elective government, as practiced by the Seneca.

Elementary Science Fair Fun



Difference between ACT and SAT Exams

The ACT is an achievement test measuring what a student has learned in school. The SAT is an aptitude test measuring testing reasoning and verbal abilities.

The ACT has 5 components: English, Mathematics, Reading, Sciences and an optional writing test. You take the writing test only if required by the college(s) you're applying to.

The SAT has 3 components: Critical Reasoning, Mathematics, and a required writing test.


The ACT is scored based on the number of correct answers with no penalty for guessing. The SAT has a correction for guessing. They take off for wrong answers.
